Drug Classification	Drug Name(s)	Diagnosis
Typical Antipsychotics “-azine”	Haldol (haloperidol) Prolixin (fluphenazine) Thorazine (chlorpromazine) Trilafon (perphenazine) Mellaril (thioridazine)	Prescribed to <u>treat schizophrenia</u> and to reduce the symptoms associated with psychotic conditions such as bipolar, psychotic depression, different types of psychoses
Atypical Antipsychotics “-one; -ine”	Abilify (aripiprazole) Risperdal (risperidone) Geodon (ziprasidone) Seroquel (quetiapine) Zyprexa (olanzapine) Clozaril (clozapine)	
Anxiolytics - Anti-anxiety Benzodiazepines- “-am”	Xanax (Alprazolam) Klonopin (Clonazepam) Valium (Diazepam) Ativan (Lorazepam) Buspar (Buspirone)	Anxiety & Panic disorders Tend to work rather quickly and can be habit-forming- better for short-term use
Stimulants	Adderall - (XR) Focalin – (XR) Vyvanse Ritalin Concerta	ADD ADHD
Selective Serotonin Reuptake Inhibitor (SSRI) Class of Antidepressants “-pram/-ine”	Celexa (Citalopram) Lexapro (Escitalopram) Luvox (Fluvoxamine) Paxil (Paroxetine) Prozac (Fluoxetine) Zoloft (Sertraline)	Depressive & Anxiety disorders
Serotonin-norepinephrine Reuptake Inhibitor Class of Antidepressants	Strattera Cymbalta Effexor XR Pristiq	Depressive & Anxiety disorders
Mood stabilizers	Lithium (Lithobid) Tegretol (Carbamazepine) Depakote (Divalproex Sodium)	Bipolar disorder Seizures Panic attacks
Anticonvulsant	Carbatrol (Carbamazepine) Topamax (Topiramate)	Seizures Nerve pain Bipolar disorder
